



## **Facilities Run by the State of North Carolina**

While most facilities in North Carolina are owned and operated by private individuals or companies, some are run by the State itself. This fact sheet gives a brief overview of those facilities and who you can contact for more information about each.

### **Alcohol and Drug Abuse Treatment Centers (ADATC)**

What is an ADATC?	An inpatient substance abuse treatment facility.
Who does an ADATC serve?	Adults with alcohol and other substance abuse disorders.

## Developmental Centers

What is a Developmental Center?	A residential facility that provides care and supervision to people with developmental disabilities. It may also be called an Intermediate Care Facility for Individuals with Intellectual Disabilities (ICF/IID).
Who does a Developmental Center serve?	Children, adolescents or adults who have intellectual disabilities.
What and where are the Developmental Centers?	<ul style="list-style-type: none"><li>- Caswell Developmental Center – Kinston</li><li>- J. Iverson Riddle Developmental Center – Morganton</li><li>- Murdoch Developmental Center – Butner</li></ul>
Are there any special programs available at the Developmental Centers?	<ul style="list-style-type: none"><li>- There are four special programs at the Murdoch Center:<ul style="list-style-type: none"><li>- BART (Behaviorally Advanced Residential Treatment) serves young adult men with developmental disabilities and extreme behavior difficulties</li><li>- STARS (Specialized Treatment for Adolescents in a Residential Setting) serves adolescents 13-17 years old who have developmental disabilities and psychiatric disabilities</li><li>- PATH (Partners in Autism Treatment and Habilitation) serves children 6-16 years old with autism spectrum disorder and serious behavior difficulties</li><li>- TRACK (Therapeutic Respite Addressing Crisis for Kids) serves children 5-17 years old who have intellectual disabilities and/or autism spectrum disorder and are in emergency crisis situations</li></ul></li></ul>

## Neuro-Medical Treatment Centers

What is a NMTC?	A residential facility that provides nursing care to individuals with disabilities. It is essentially a State-operated nursing home.
Who does a NMTC serve?	In general, adults with developmental disabilities and/or Alzheimer’s Disease. One NMTC (Longleaf) serve adults with psychiatric disabilities who require nursing care.
What and where are the NMTCs?	Black Mountain NMTC – Black Mountain Longleaf NMTC – Wilson O’Berry NMTC – Goldsboro

## Psychiatric Hospitals

What is a psychiatric hospital?	An inpatient psychiatric treatment facility.
Who does a psychiatric hospital serve?	Adolescents or adults who have acute psychiatric disabilities or substance abuse disorders.
What and where are the psychiatric hospitals?	Broughton Hospital – Morganton Central Regional Hospital – Butner Cherry Hospital – Goldsboro
Are there any special programs available at the psychiatric hospitals?	Broughton Hospital has a unit for people who are Deaf.

What and where are the residential programs?	<ul style="list-style-type: none"><li>- Whitaker PRTF is a Psychiatric Residential Treatment Facility (PRTF). It provides long-term inpatient services to adolescents. It is located in Butner.</li><li>- The Wright School is a residential mental health facility for children 6-12 years old. It is located in Durham.</li></ul>
Who do the programs serve?	Children and adolescents with severe emotional and behavior difficulties.

## Residential Schools

What is a residential school?	A K-12 school that offers the option for students to remain overnight on campus in a dormitory during the week.
Who does a residential school serve?	Children and adolescents who have vision or hearing disabilities and whose Individualized Education Program Team (IEP Team) decides to assign to a residential school.
What and where are the residential schools?	Eastern North Carolina School for the Deaf – Wilson Governor Morehead School for the Blind – Raleigh North Carolina School for the Deaf – Morganton
